

Methodology

The study was conducted by Burson Insights, Data and Intelligence (formerly BSG).

Burson conducted a 20-min survey September 19-September 24, 2025 among: N = 759 General Population (MoE +/- 3.56%).

Including over samples of specific demographic and ideological subgroups, a total of 2,655 individuals were surveyed.

The survey was conducted online and sampled and weighed to reflect a representative population of the United States.

Top takeaways

1. Awareness & Concerns

- Two years into the war, Americans are no more concerned about antisemitism now as compared to before the war started
- One third (36%) of Americans either don't believe antisemitism is a problem or aren't particularly concerned about it.
- Of those who say antisemitism has increased, 39% say it's because Jew-hatred has become socially acceptable.

2. Antisemitism and the Israel-Hamas War

- Nearly 1 in 4 Americans (23%) see antisemitism as a legitimate form of protest in response to the Israel-Hamas war
- Nearly a third of Americans (31%) admit it's hard to separate how they feel about Jews when they see what's happening in Gaza.
- A quarter of Americans (26%) say their feelings toward Israel have become more negative in the past two years — rising to 59% among young Progressives.
- More than half of Americans (53%) admit that criticism of Israel is often a cover for antisemitic views.

3. Misconceptions and Harmful Beliefs

- 42% don't distinguish between the Israeli government and Jewish people.
- 41% of Americans do not consider it antisemitic to claim Jews are more loyal to Israel than the U.S.
- 38% don't believe protesting outside synagogues is antisemitic.
- 20% of Americans say it's acceptable to boycott Jewish-owned business.




What Americans know – and don't know – about antisemitism

% who believe the amount of hatred towards Jewish people is a problem Showing NET "Think it's a problem" among GEN POP




Q2: Thinking about the United States specifically, how worried are you about the amount of hate against Jewish people in our country




One third of Americans say they aren't familiar with the term 'antisemitism'

Familiarity with the term "Antisemitism"






Of those who say antisemitism is increasing, 39% say it's become more socially acceptable to express hatred toward Jews

About a third of Americans believe public figures aren't speaking out strongly enough and there's a lack of accountability & enforcement




Q19a: Which of the following do you think are the main reasons for this increase? Please select all that apply.








The blurry line between Israel's War in Gaza and attitudes towards American Jews






What's driving negative views?






Top reasons perceptions of Israel have become more negative





42% of Americans don't distinguish between the Israeli government and Jewish people




I don't believe there's a clear distinction between the Israeli government and Jewish people

Q26: Please indicate whether you agree or disagree with each of the following statements: I believe there is a clear distinction between the Israeli government and Jewish people in general




Many Americans admit it's hard to separate how they feel about <u>Jews</u> in light of the war

More than half of Americans say criticism of Israel is often a cover for anti-Jewish views


% Agree that criticism of Israel is often used as an excuse to express anti-Jewish views




89% of Americans say they are following news about the Israel-Hamas war





Americans get their news from television, while younger audiences use social media




Q11: Where are you getting your news about the current war that is going on between Israel and Hamas?
